Presentation

The first and most famous violinist of the eighteenth century in the Europe of his time, Giuseppe Tartini was a fascinating and eclectic personality, not only as a musician but also for his cosmopolitanism. It can be said that the European breath permeated his entire life, spent between Piran, today in Slovenia, and Padua, at the time both part of the Serenissima Republic of Venice, a city where he often stayed.

Evidence of his being a "citizen of the world" is his frequent trips to play in music academies or to teach. Among other things, he was in Prague for the celebrations dedicated to the coronation of Emperor Charles VI of Habsburg as King of Bohemia and then remained there for another three years.

His artistic, didactic, philosophical and scientific legacy is very broad: his vocation for teaching music is demonstrated by the creation of a cosmopolitan violin school in Padua, the so-called. "School of Nations", which welcomed students from all over Europe, but he also wrote treatises on the physics of sound: the "discovery" of the Third Sound is still today the subject of discussion and study among experts.

It is precisely the universal message of music, which in his thought would lead man to perfection (given that harmony was the basis in all things) that made Tartini an "ante litteram" pro-European, because he was rooted in a dimension both territorial (Padua and Veneto) and national and international.
